The Commission is representatives of CAAHEP's community of interest member organizations, including 25 Committees on Accreditation (CoA), of which the CoAEMSP is the largest. The CAAHEP Board of Directors takes action on the Paramedic educational programs upon the recommendation of the CoAEMSP.



We all are aware of the challenge of accreditation, but are firm in our belief that a single accreditation body is essential to the protection of our students, and most importantly, for the American public. To that end, the focus of the CoAEMSP staff has been on developing additional tools and resources to assist programs in successfully and efficiently gaining and maintaining accreditation of their Paramedic educational programs.

The challenges of COVID-19 did not wane, and it was necessary to provide programs with solutions for educating its students without compromising outcomes. Thus, a virtual ACCREDITCON event was offered in 2021 which was attended by numbers rivaling the initial in-person event. Accreditation workshops were also held virtually, and continually at capacity. Site visits were also adapted to be conducted virtually. Waivers for patient encounters as well as other tools were created. Virtual office hours were established to help programs directors make their way through the difficult times COVID-19 presented, as well as to be as accessible as possible to programs. We are most

grateful that for the past 14 years, the CoAEMSP has operated as a virtual office, with staff being spread out across the country. As a result, the challenges of finding solutions for working remotely was not an issue, and staff did not miss a beat when it came to operations.

Being a part of this organization is rewarding and humbling. I am committed, as is the rest of the CoAEMSP board and staff, to protecting your students and the public which they

serve as the single, comprehensive National EMS education accreditation agency, as defined in the EMS Education Agenda for the Future. I thank each and every one of you for the part you play in serving the public in their greatest time of need.

Report from the Executive Director

The mission of the CoAEMSP, prominently stated on our website, was greatly challenged time and again as we made our way—and continue to do so—through the COVID-19 pandemic. At the height of our nation's struggle to determine how to best handle this pandemic, and when the mandates changed sometimes day to day, the strength and resources of the CoAEMSP made it possible for us to continue our work. Thankfully, the CoAEMSP is armed with a crisis management plan, which was put to use during this time for identifying ways to help Paramedic educational programs keep training its students with minimal compromise.

Alternative use methods were developed and extended when necessary. Tools were developed to use including a Program Policy, Student Education Interruption Status Form, Temporary Waiver of Program Minimums COVID-19, Action Plan for Extended Program Interruption, Attestation of Terminal Competency COVID-19 Exception, and Preceptor Attestation of Competency COVID-19 Exception. (The Healthcare Simulation Dictionary was not developed by the CoAEMSP but is included as a valuable tool.) Virtual CoAEMSP office hours were initiated to assist programs, and a webinar was held with the CoAEMSP leadership to help open communication lines and alleviate fears.

Outside of developing resources to address COVID-19, normal operations had to continue for the overall benefit of Paramedic educational programs looking to gain or maintain CAAHEP accreditation. Webinars, workshops, and the ACCREDITCON collaborative continued to support EMS constituents in their respective accreditation roles.

The CoAEMSP was proud to once again support EMS Week as a way to honor and promote the great work of those first responders serving the American public. We realize that one week does not do justice in recognizing their dedication 365 days of the year!

The CoAEMSP was delighted to welcome Randy Kuykendall, MLS, NRP, to the CoAEMSP staff in the role of Technical Consultant early in 2022. Randy will focus on national EMS accreditation efforts, aligning with the broader States' EMS perspective.

Randy is well known in EMS nationally for more than four decades of service, first as the State EMS Training Coordinator for the State of New Mexico and then as the State EMS Director in Colorado. He has also served as a Paramedic Program Director, and his background in education gives him the ability to understand the job done each day in the classroom. Randy's role as the Director of the Health Facilities and EMS Division at the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment brings a rare perspective of where EMS fits into the broader healthcare system of both acute and long-term care nationally. 



The Virtues of Accreditation

Why is accreditation important?

Accreditation provides key characteristics of accredited programs, identifying what a program should pursue and cultivate (virtues) as well as signal prohibitions (vices) that must be avoided. Regardless of the specialty or programmatic particulars, virtues and vices may be used to define a context in which general competencies may be understood and yield operational guidance upon which ultimate discussions of evaluation, remediation, and graduation may be predicated.

Accreditation assures professional competence: Graduates from a CAAHEP-accredited program have achieved the psychomotor and affective competencies to ensure patient safety.

Accreditation offers standardization, uniformity, and consistency: All CAAHEP-accredited programs prepare entry-level Paramedics, so employers can be guaranteed that the students know a given body of entry-level knowledge.

Accreditation requires external verification, review, and validation: In fulfilling the standards, CAAHEP-accredited programs submit their outcomes to CoAEMSP for an annual review and go through a comprehensive site visit review with CAAHEP every five years.

Accreditation protects resources: The CAAHEP *Standards and Guidelines* specify that the students and faculty have access to specific resources in order to ensure that the program can comply with the national standards.

Accreditation enhances the institution's reputation: Institutions participating in programmatic accreditation distinguish themselves from other institutions.

Accreditation is public: CAAHEP-accredited programs are listed in a CAAHEP database for student and educator access, and CAAHEP-accredited programs post their status and outcomes.

Accreditation travels well: Employers across the country recognize the value of accreditation.

Accreditation advances the profession: The standardization, uniformity, and consistency that accreditation ensures, as well as the review of the *Standards and Guidelines* move the profession forward toward greater recognition in the health field.

On March 23, 2018, the CoAEMSP officially announced to the EMS community its plan to hold a conference to give programs information to successfully gain and maintain accreditation.

Louisville, Kentucky was chosen as the site for **ACCREDITCON**.

ACCREDITCON was designed to bring together EMS experts, and CoAEMSP staff and board in order for constituents to obtain answers to pertinent questions regarding initial and continuing CAAHEP accreditation for Paramedic educational programs.
